- MicroSociety will ask parents to serve on the FACE committee to support this process.
 The parents will be asked at the end of the school year to serve on the following year's
 committee. Depending on COVID restrictions, the committee will either meet in
 person or via Zoom.
- MicroSociety shall enable the formation of our PATCHES group, an organization that will foster parental and community involvement within the school that will meet twice a semester.
- MicroSociety will involve parents on school family engagement planning committees. Meet with the PATCHES to identify areas of need.
- Parents are asked to complete a survey during spring conferences to evaluate each program and give suggestions for the following year. If the parent is unable to attend the spring conference, the survey will be sent via email, text, or Dojo.

- Teachers will use the School Web site to house classroom websites for each teacher. Homework assignments and pertinent classroom information will be available on classroom websites. Parents may use e-mail to communicate with members of the school staff. Teachers will communicate with parent(s) using Class Dojo or email, parent(s) may also communicate with teachers using Class Dojo.
- Teachers will distribute a newsletter to parents with important information about their child(ren) learning.
- Each teacher will send home student papers and work samples for the parents to review.
- Teachers will routinely contact parents on an individual basis to communicate about their child's progress. Teachers will call parents at their convenience to discuss their child's progress. Teachers also use Class Dojo to communicate with parents. Parents are also able to use Class Dojo to contact anyone at MicroSociety. By using Class Dojo, it allows the parent to respond at their earliest convenience. Teachers also offer to meet with parents before school, during their prep, and after school.
- MicroSociety will provide parent(s) reports and/or report cards with information regarding their child's academic progress and upcoming classroom and school events.
- Teachers will send parents a parent friendly letter in the first report card that explains
 their child's test results and standardized test scores if they are unable to attend
 parent/teacher conferences.
- Micorsociety will use a call out system to alert parents of school closings, important meetings, etc...
- The school will use the student handbook, school website, signage at the school entrance, and parent orientation meetings about the School wide Title I Plan and how to get a copy upon request.

- Included in the Jonesboro Public School's policy handbook is the school's process for resolving parental concerns, including how to define a problem, whom to approach first, and how to develop solutions.
- MicroSociety will distribute informational packets each year that includes a copy of the school's parental involvement plan, survey for volunteer interests, recommended roles for parents/ teachers/students and school, suggestions of ways parents can become involved in their child's education, parental involvement activities planned for the current school year and information about the system that will be used to allow parents and teachers to communicate (notes, phone calls, email, texting, Class Dojo ..) - There will be two Parent/Teacher conferences held during the school year. The first conference will be October 21, 2021 from 2:30-8:30. The second conference will be March 17, 2022, from 2:30-8:30. If parent(s) are unable to attend Parent/Teacher conferences, teachers will give the parent(s) several different times they can meet with them. If they are unable to meet in person, the teacher will offer a phone call, conference over Dojo, or via Zoom. Parent/Teacher conferences may be held via Zoom for the school year of 2021 2022 due to Covid Restrictions.
- Teachers will hold conferences individually with parents of children in their classrooms if permitted. If not, teachers will hold conferences via Zoom. Parents will be given a summary of the student's test scores and an explanation of the interventions teachers are using to assist the child in reaching achievement goals. Parents will be asked to engage in discussion of how they can support these efforts. Parents will also be given suggestions for coordinating school parent efforts and explanations of homework and grading procedures. If more conferences are needed, parents will be contacted.
- MicroSociety uses TransPerfect. This is a call-in interpreting service. Someone at the school calls TransPerfect and an interpreter is available. This allows the school and parent to have a conversation in the parent's home language. TransPerfect will be used when the school needs to contact parents for brief conversations.
- MicroSociety will have a Family Night which will provide an opportunity for the parents and their child(ren) to experience the school in a positive and helpful manner while school staff may provide any needed assistance or encouragement. This will take place in the second semester. Additional opportunities for parents/stakeholders to participate in school based activities: Family/Child(ren) Prom and Arise to Read

- Family Picnic. If Covid restrictions are still in place, MicroSociety will search for alternatives for Family Night as well as other events.
- PATCHES Meetings will be held twice a semester to obtain feedback from parent(s).

- MicroSociety staff, parents, and students will develop a school, parent-student compact. - The Compact is handed out at the beginning of the school year, collected and stored in the teacher's classrooms (student folders). The students that do not return their form, parents/guardians will be contacted by phone, form sent home a 2nd and 3rd time. At the end of the year, all compacts will be stored in the office.
- There will be two Parent/Teachers conferences held during the school year. The first conference will be October 21, 2021 from 2:30 8:30. The second conference will be March 17, 2022, from 2:30 8:30. The teachers will provide the parents with report cards, ACTAspire scores, reading inventory scores, math placement, and contact information. If the parent is unable to attend on this day, the teacher will provide other options to the parent. Due to Covid restrictions from the previous year, parent/ teacher conferences maybe held via Zoom again.
- Volunteers sign in at the office each time they visit using a Google Form. This
 information will be compiled into a Google Sheet for the school staff to access when
 needing volunteers. If volunteers are not allowed in the building due to Covid
 restrictions, this process will still be used the following year. If there are any volunteers
 at MicroSociety, they will use their phone to sign the Google Form to avoid sharing
 one device.
- The staff will send home reports on students' district assessments.

- Parents may contact the staff via phone, text, Class Dojo, email, or sending a note. Parents may use text, email, and Class Dojo at any time.
- Parents are invited to music programs, awards ceremonies, volunteer in classrooms, and family nights. Parents are invited by the following methods: notes in the child's folder, email, phone call, Dojo, in person, or text message. Due to Covid, the events listed above may be online for the 2021 2022 school year.

- MicroSociety will share with parents about the budget for parent and family engagement activities and programs during the Title 1 meeting.
- MicroSociety provides an opportunity for parents to take a survey at parent teacher conferences during the fall and spring to provide input on areas at the school.

- MicroSociety will work with First United Methodist to provide underserved families with a backpack of food each Friday. Several anonymous individuals donate items of food for the backpacks.
- There will be at least one special food box distribution per week to families. To be eligible the family should have a child enrolled and attending MicroSociety Elementary. This food will be distributed from our community partner, Word Baptist Church. MicroSociety staff and Word Baptist will partner to effectively run the program. The food from this program is meant for all family members, not just the individual child.
- The Emergency School Pantry and Food Box Program will be administered by Arkansas Foodbank and implemented in partnership with Food Bank of Northeast Arkansas, Food Bank of North Central Arkansas, Northwest Arkansas Foodbank, Harvest Regional Food Bank, and River Valley Regional Food Bank. The purpose of the program is to provide additional food assistance to MicroSociety families. This program will target children and families being served by USDA Child Feeding Programs in schools or at community sites.
- Men of Micro will be meeting with the 6th grade boys during their lunch to build leadership skills.

- MicroSociety has entered a partnership with NEA Tennis to provide students with skills to learn tennis.
- MicroSociety will partner with the Public Library to provide families with a literacy night.
- MicroSociety staff delivers Thanksgiving meals to families in need. The school works with the food bank to assemble the meals.
- MicroSociety works with several different organizations to provide extra help to students who struggle in school by providing volunteers to be lunch buddies and tutors.
- MicroSociety works closely with Walnut Street Baptist Church to provide Arise to Read volunteers.
- First United Methodist provides a Christmas Emporium to families in need at MicroSociety.
- MicroSociety partners with several community members to provide the parents and students a parent(s)/child(ren) dance.
- MicroSociety staff works with Junior Auxiliary of Jonesboro, AR to provide students with book clubs and time tales (multiplication program). The 2021 - 2022 school year may look different for Junior Auxiliary volunteers and will depend on what Covid restrictions are in place.
- MicroSociety shall enable the formation of our PATCHES, an organization that will foster parental and community involvement within the school that will meet twice a semester. PATCHES may meet more often if the need arises.
- The Parent Family Engagement plan is aligned with and included in the school improvement plan.

 Newsletters will inform parents of the volunteer opportunities coming up weekly and/or monthly and who to contact for the volunteer activity. Notices and electronic messages are sent to provide information to parents about upcoming volunteer needs. This provides parent and community members the opportunity to support the

- instructional program through guest speakers, book club leaders, musical programs, mentoring, and book fair volunteers.
- MicroSociety will provide orientation training to parents and community members by the staff members and/or volunteers in charge of the various school volunteer programs. The training provides information to volunteers to ensure their volunteer experience is pleasant and successful.
- MicroSociety offers a magnet preview night, during the second semester, to allow prospective students and their parents an opportunity to view the campus and classes at MicroSociety. The night also offers the opportunity to meet and question all staff members about the academic programs and aspects of MicroSociety.
- MicroSociety staff and parent volunteers provide instruction to parents by purchasing parenting materials, which can be copied and sent home. These materials help parents to learn how to incorporate developmentally appropriate learning activities in the home environment. Also, access to the Department of Education website tools for parent(s) and other strategies or curricula developed or acquired by the school for parents at home parental instruction approved by the Department of Education.

- The school district provided parents with internet access from different school parking lots during school shutdown. This allowed students to complete their assigned work.
